

## **DEREK BOSHIER**

DEREK BOSHIER first came to prominence with his paintings as a student at the Royal College of Art in London in the early 1960's, together with his fellow students David Hockney, Allen Jones, RB Kitaj and others in the British Pop Art Movement.

Subsequently he has worked in many other mediums – drawing, film three dimensional object making, books, installations, photography and graphics (working with Pop music groups The Clash and David Bowie).

More recent work has included an installation, Journey/Israel Project, concerned with Jewish and Israeli culture: a series of paintings and drawings around the themes of Los Angeles (the Los Angeles Times, Freeways, Architecture, Los Angeles Art Collectors and Transsexuals) and an exhibition of paintings on the theme of 'Sport', (football, soccer, baseball, swimming, cycling, wrestling, basketball, athletics etc.) A painting commission from the N.F.L (National Football League – American Football), and exhibitions in Los Angeles and Paris.
